#### **Course Description**

The human skeletal system for forensic identification. Lab experience in identification of osteological material to answer questions regarding sex, age, ethnicity and cause of death.

## **Course Learning Outcomes (CLO)**

- 3. Knowledge of the history of anthropological thought and its place in modern intellectual history.
- 4. Knowledge of the research methods of the sub-disciplines of anthropology, and ability to apply appropriate research methods in at least one sub-discipline.
- 5. Ability to present and communicate anthropological knowledge and the results of anthropological research to different audiences.

## Course Requirements and Assignments (Required - Delete the word "Required" in final draft)

"Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally three hours per unit per week) for instruction, preparation/studying, or course related activities, including but not limited to internships, labs, and clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus."

Quizzes: Since this is a hands-on course, grades are based on quizzes (involving identification of skeletal material and forensic questions revolving around topics of ancestry, sex, age, human/nonhuman, homicide/accident, etc.) and the final exam. There will be seven quizzes, which is about one every other week; each quiz is cumulative. Each quiz is worth 10% of your final grade. There will be a comprehensive final quiz, which is worth 30% of your final grade and will be held during final's week and cannot be taken earlier.

Procedures for taking the quizzes: students will have a set amount of time at each bone station, they will not compare stations by going back and forth to stations or moving bones. Students may visit each station only once. Spelling counts. After all students have completed the quiz, lecture will resume. More information regarding quiz procedures will be provided on the quiz or exam days!

#### **Final Examination or Evaluation**

"Faculty members are required to have a culminating activity for their courses, which can include a final examination, a final research paper or project, a final creative work or performance, a final portfolio of work, or other appropriate assignment."

#### There will be a cumulative final exam.

## **Attendance and Participation**

Since this is a hands-on course with emphasis on identification skeletal materials, attendance and participation are essential. I highly recommend students attend class as often as possible; and, it is important to arrive on time and attend the entire class period. I will not hold extra hours for those who missed class.

#### Make-up Work

Make-up quizzes will not be possible. With a valid, documented excuse, I will weigh other quizzes slightly higher (e.g., each quiz is normally 10%, but if you have only 6 quizzes, each will be worth 11.67%). This reweighting is only for students with a valid documented excuse. Please note that it is not possible to make up class time or re-schedule the final exam.
