Course Requirements and Assignments

"Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally three hours per unit per week) for instruction, preparation/studying, or course related activities, including but not limited to internships, labs, and clinical practica. Final Examination or Evaluation

Upon completion of this course students will complete an individual research paper on an Economic Topic. You can either choose from a list of Economic Topics or choose your own. The paper can either be a theoretical exploration or a statistical presentation of the topic The research paper will consist of the following elements:

- A Paper Proposal. <u>This is due by Thursday, March 18, 2021</u>. This should be a 1-2 pages long (approximately 400-500 words). In your proposal, you need to include your research question, hypothesis, data sources, and 3-5 economic journal articles you plan to use.
- An initial literature review for your Final Paper. The literature review is <u>due on</u> <u>Tuesday, April 6, 2021</u>. This needs to have at least 15 citations in a research appropriate format. To complete this you need to attend the class Library Day which will be announced in class. You can add to this literature review as you progress through writing your Final Paper
- A Final Paper Draft. <u>This is due on Tuesday, April 27</u>. This draft needs to be as close to completion as possible. You will continue to improve on this draft. However, this will be the draft that you will receive comments on both from your peers and me
- Final research paper. This is due on the day the Final Exam is scheduled for this course, <u>Thursday, May 13</u>. This will be based on the final draft paper with only minor modifications.

In addition to the research paper students will be graded on the following:

- In-class daily journals. This will be at the beginning of each class and will be based on a prompt. I will check it in class.
- In-class exercises. This will be at the end of each class and will apply the writing topics taught in class. It will be peer graded and turned in.
- Midterm. <u>This will be on Friday, March. 5, 2021</u>. It will conclude the grammar portion of this course.
- Short papers and peer reviews.: I will divide the class into two groups by the second week of the semester, and each student will have a buddy. Each week one group will complete a 400 word (minimum) Thought Essay on an Economic Topic (I will have prompts to choose from). You will need to apply economic concepts to the prompts and analyze the topic accordingly. The other group will complete a 200-word (minimum) peer review of the Thought Essay of their buddy. Thought Essays will be due on Tuesdays, and Peer-review reports on Thursdays. Peer Review will be based on a Structured Rubric that will be handed out in class
- Student presentations and class peer reviews. We will spend the last five class sessions on student presentations. <u>Attendance is required for these presentations</u>. Every student not presenting has to submit an in-class peer review for each presentation. I will handout rubrics for you to use.

<u>Please plan for these due dates early. I do not accept any late work. If you do not submit</u> these on time you will earn a zero for this component of the course.
