Course Format

Technology Intensive, Hybrid, and Online Courses

This course adopts a completely online, asynchronous delivery format with no designated day/time meeting pattern. Reliable internet connectivity and a computer or laptop with <u>webcam and microphone</u> are required for the course. This course requires the use of electronic proctoring through <u>ProctorU</u> for midterm exams and the final exam.

Course Description

SJSU Catalog Description: Allocation of resources and distribution of income as affected by the workings of the price system and by government policies.

Further Description: Microeconomics studies the choice of individuals, firms, the government, and other organizations. The course will provide an introduction to the concepts and tools used by economists to analyze decisions made by individuals and firms who face limited resources.

Course Prerequisites

There are no course prerequisites. Econ 1B may be taken concurrently or prior to Econ 1A.
