COURSE DESCRIPTION

English 1A is the first course in SJSU's two-semester lower-division composition sequence; it provides an introduction to baccalaureate-level composition, with attention to the "personal voice" and personal experience, on the one hand, and the more formal attitudes and demands of writing at the university (expository and argumentative essays), on the other. Students will develop college-level reading abilities, rhetorical sophistication, and writing styles that give form and coherence to complex ideas and feelings. **Prerequisites:** Placement by the English Proficiency Test (EPT), or passage of an approved substitute course for the EPT.

COURSE GOALS AND STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Students shall achieve the ability to write complete essays that demonstrate college-level proficiency in all of the following:

- Clear and effective communication of meaning.
- An identifiable focus, tailored to a particular audience and purpose (argumentative essays will state their thesis clearly and show implied or stated awareness of some opposing point of view).
- The ability to perform effectively the essential steps of the writing process (prewriting, organizing, composing, revising, and editing).
- The ability to explain, analyze, develop, and criticize ideas effectively.
- Effective use within their own essays of supporting material drawn from reading or other sources.
- Effective organization within the paragraph and the essay.
- Accuracy, variety, and clarity of sentences.
- Appropriate diction.
- Control of conventional mechanics (e.g., punctuation, spelling, reference, agreement).

STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES (SLO):

- 1: Students shall write complete essays that demonstrate the ability to perform effectively the essential steps in the writing process (prewriting, organizing, composing, revising, and editing).
- 2: Students shall write complete essays that demonstrate the ability to express (explain, analyze, develop, and criticize) ideas effectively.
- **3:** Students shall write complete essays that demonstrate the ability to use correct grammar (syntax, mechanics, and citation of sources) at a college level of sophistication.
- **4:** Students shall write complete essays that demonstrate the ability to write for different audiences.

COURSE GUIDELINES

Writing: In-class exercises and a series of essays will give you practice in prewriting, organizing, writing, revising, editing, and proofreading. A series of in-class and out-of-class essays, including substantive rewrites, will total 8,000 words for the semester. This minimum requirement excludes the final exam, in-class writing exercises, and journals. Out-of-class essays must be typed (Times New Roman, 12).

Reading: Reading is an essential part of learning to write well. Throughout the semester, you will keep a journal to reflect on assigned readings. Prompts will be given before each assignment. Please come to class prepared to discuss the readings.

Final Assignment: This course does not have a final exam. Instead, you will write a critical reflection essay at the end of the semester, worth 10% of your grade. In this essay, you will reflect on the progress of your work over the course of the semester. A prompt and rubric will be provided.

GENERAL CLASS POLICIES

Come to class on time and prepared. Participation in class discussions will affect your grade. You are responsible for all policies on syllabus, no exceptions. No cell phones.

LATE WORK

In-class essays: may be made up during office hours if advance notice (24 hours) of absence or a doctor's note is provided. For advance notice less than 24 hours, in-class essays can be made up during office hours and will be deducted a full letter grade.

Out-of-class essays: Hard copies are due at the beginning of class on the due date. (Remember that printers jam and lines at computer labs can be long. Make arrangements to print your work the day before the deadline to avoid lateness.) Any essays that are not turned in via hard copy at the beginning of class on the due date will be considered late.

Late deadlines: For the first three out-of-class essays, an extended deadline will be offered, beginning after the collection of essays in class and ending at a designated time and date later in the week (see Course Schedule). Essays submitted during this period will be accepted only via email, with the subject line: LATE (ASSIGNMENT NAME). Late essays that meet these guidelines will be deducted a full letter grade. Late essays that fail to meet these guidelines or are not received by the extended deadline will receive an F grade. Note: Late essays will not be accepted for Revision and Final Reflection.

Reading journal assignments: cannot be made up or submitted after the deadline. Missed journal assignments will receive a "0" score.

ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING POLICY

Grading: This class must be passed with a **C** or better to move on to CORE GE Area C3 and to satisfy the prerequisite for English 1B. (**C- or lower is not acceptable.**) A

passing grade in the course signifies that the student is a capable college-level writer and reader of English. Grades in English Department courses reflect the quality of student writing as well as the quality of ideas being conveyed. All student writing should be distinguished by correct grammar and punctuation, appropriate diction and syntax, and well-organized paragraphs. Participation is determined by demonstrated effort (showing up on time, meeting deadlines, adhering to guidelines and course policies).

Final grade will be determined as follows:

At-home and revised essays	50%
In-class essays	20%
Participation and Reading Journal	20%
Final Critical Reflection Essay	10%

Essays will be graded by the following criteria:

An "A" essay is organized and well-developed, demonstrating a clear understanding and fulfillment of the assignment, written in a unique and compelling voice. It will show the student's ability to use language effectively with a solid command of grammar, mechanics, and usage.

A "B" essay demonstrates competence in the same categories as an "A" essay, but it may show slight weakness in one of these areas. It will respond to the topic suitably and may contain some grammatical, mechanical or usage errors.

A "C" essay will complete the requirements of the assignment, but it will show weaknesses in fundamentals, such as development. It may show significant weakness in mastery of grammar, mechanics, usage, or voice.

A "**D**" essay will neglect to meet all the requirements of the assignment or may be superficial in its treatment of the topic. It may lack development or fail to stay on topic. It may contain grammatical, mechanical, and/or usage errors that interfere with reader comprehension.

An "F" essay does not fulfill the requirements of the assignment.
