# **ENGL 1A Course Description**

English 1A is an introductory writing course that will help students understand the writing process and the goals, dynamics, and genres of written communication. Through interpretation and analysis of texts, students will develop clear thinking and effective writing that give form and coherence to complex ideas. Students will practice these skills by writing for various audiences and rhetorical situations.

# **ENGL 1A Learning Outcomes (CLO)**

Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to

- 1. communicate meaning clearly and effectively;
- 2. identify focus, tailored to a particular audience and purpose;
- 3. perform effectively the essential steps of the writing process (prewriting, organizing, composing, revising, and editing);
- 4. explain, analyze, develop, and criticize ideas effectively;
- 5. use within an essay supporting material drawn from primary and secondary sources, including appropriate citations;
- 6. organize individual paragraphs and entire essays;
- 7. construct sentences with accuracy, variety, and clarity;

- 8. use appropriate diction and tone;
- 9. control conventions of written English (e.g., punctuation, spelling, reference, agreement).

## **GE Area A2 Course Description**

ENGL 1A fulfills the written communication general education requirement. Courses in GE Area A2 cultivate an understanding of the writing process and the goals, dynamics, and genres of written communication, with special attention to the nature of writing in the university. Students will develop college-level reading abilities, rhetorical sophistication, and writing styles that give form and coherence to complex ideas and feelings. A passing grade of C or better signifies that the student is a capable college-level writer and reader of English.

### **GE A2 Learning Outcomes (GELO)**

In addition to the learning objectives stated above, ENGL 1A also measures the learning goals of GE Area A2. Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to

- 1. demonstrate the ability to read actively and rhetorically;
- 2. demonstrate the ability to perform the essential steps in the writing process (prewriting, organizing, composing, revising, and editing) and demonstrate an awareness of said performance;
- 3. articulate an awareness of and write according to the rhetorical features of texts, such as purpose, audience, context, and rhetorical appeals;
- 4. demonstrate the ability to integrate their ideas and those of others by explaining, analyzing, developing, and criticizing ideas effectively in several genres;
- 5. demonstrate college-level language use, clarity, and grammatical proficiency in writing.

### **ENGL 1A Course Content**

<u>Diversity</u>: SJSU studies include an emphasis on diversity. Students will engage in integrated reading and writing assignments to construct their own arguments on complex issues that generate meaningful public debate. Readings for the course will include writers of different genders and from different socio-economic classes.

<u>Writing:</u> Writing assignments shall give students repeated practice in all phases of the writing process: prewriting, organizing, writing, revising, and editing. This class requires a minimum of 8000 words, at least 4000 of which must be in revised final draft form. Because in-class writing is valued and students should be able to perform well in timed writing situations, at least two essays shall be written in class. In addition, ENGL 1A classes require multiple out-of-class essays. <u>Students must bring lined paper and pens to every class</u>.

<u>Reading</u>: Most readings will require written responses. Assigned readings are mandatory and essential for participation in the class discussions. They are carefully selected examples of the studied types of writing you are going to work on during the semester. You must provide adequate Reading Responses (RR), which meet GELO 2-5 and are part of your final grade. **Your written response must be between 300-400 words and must be typed in Times New Roman, 12 point font, double-spaced**. You must submit it by the due date to receive full credit in the form required by the instructor and be ready to use it in a class discussion. If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to submit your response on or before the due date to receive full participation credit. Late responses will lose one point per day.

<u>Final Experience</u>: Per Academic Senate policy S06-4, all classes require a final exam experience (seewww.sjsu.edu/senate/docs/S06-4.pdf). The final exam schedule is online: <u>http://info.sjsu.edu/web-</u>

Specific instructions will be given towards the end of the semester. The presentation is part of your final grade.

# **Grading Policy**

A-F. This class must be passed with a C or better to move on to CORE GE Area A3 and to satisfy the prerequisite for English 1B. A passing grade in the course signifies that the student is a capable college-level writer and reader of English. **This course must be passed with a C or better as a CSU graduation requirement.**

Requirements for particular assignments will vary, but in all cases essay grades will reflect the paper's effectiveness, which are broken down into three major areas: content (this includes maturity and sophistication of thought), organization, and expression. All assignments, quizzes, and exams are graded on a traditional A-F scale. *Double the points for out-of-class essay grades, x10 for final course grade scale.*

The following are the criteria by which essays are typically evaluated in first-year writing courses: An "A" essay is organized and well-developed, demonstrating a clear understanding and fulfillment of the assignment, written in a unique and compelling voice. It will show the student's ability to use language effectively with a solid command of grammar, mechanics, and usage.

A "B" essay demonstrates competence in the same categories as an "A" essay, but it may show slight weakness in one of these areas. It will respond to the topic suitably and may contain some grammatical, mechanical or usage errors.

A "C" essay will complete the requirements of the assignment, but it will show weaknesses in fundamentals, such as development. It may show weakness in mastery of grammar, mechanics, usage, or voice.

A "D" essay will neglect to meet all the requirements of the assignment or may be superficial in its treatment of the topic. It may lack development or fail to stay on topic. It may contain grammatical, mechanical, and/or usage errors that interfere with reader comprehension.

An "F" essay does not fulfill the requirements of the assignment.

# **Classroom Protocol**

Attendance per se shall not be used as a criterion for grading."
