# **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

In this course, we will read and write poetry, creative non-fiction, and short fiction. The course will be taught using a combination of discussion, exercises and writing workshops. In the discussion, we will closely read and analyze published works of creative writing. In the writing workshops, you will analyze and critique the creative work of fellow class members. At the end of the semester, each of you will produce a portfolio of work.

- 3. Write clearly, effectively, and creatively, and adjust writing style appropriately to the content, the context, and the nature of the subject;
- 4. Develop and carry out research projects, and locate, evaluate, organize, and incorporate information effectively;
- 5. Articulate the relations among culture, history, and texts.

# ENGL 71 Requirements and Assignments

SJSU classes are designed such that in order to be successful, you are expected to spend a minimum of fortyfive hours for each unit of credit (normally three hours per unit per week), including preparing for class, participating in course activities, completing assignments, and so on.

All written work must...

- ...be submitted to the correct folder on the SJSU Canvas portal for this course.
- ...be fully formatted according to MLA standards.
- ...meet the minimum word count to be considered for full credit.

# In Class Assignments (30 points each):

We will undertake a number of writing assignments pertaining to readings, videos, podcasts, and other forms of media. Students may write their work in class and submit later that night. All work, both in and out of class, must be submitted to its proper assignment folder on Canvas.

# Critical Responses (30 points each | 4 x 500):

You will write (4), 500 word Critical Responses based on readings from the text. See the assignment guidelines on Canvas for grading criteria for the responses.

# Attend Poetry Reading or Literary Event, Complete Critical Response (50 points each | 2 x 500):

Attend a poetry reading, or other literary event at the University. Then, complete (2 x 500) critical responses detailing the event. See the following resources for event listings and times.

#### Final Creative Manuscript (100 points):

This will be a collection of your writing assignments, 10-15 pages in length, plus a 700-word artistic statement for the creative manuscript. See handout on grading criteria for final manuscript.

- 4-5 pages Fiction
- 4-5 pages Non Fiction
- 8-10 pages Poetry

#### **Formatting Requirement – Automatic Point Reduction**

- (- 10) under minimum word count, additional (-10) if under 50% of count
- (- 5) per MLA/APA/CMS section- Heading / Body / Work Cited

#### Peer Review Response (30 points each | 2 x 250):

Students will be required to submit two peer review responses for each essay. During the workshop session for each draft, students should take notes and record feedback. Students will then write two, 250 word responses to their peer's essay that was shared during the workshop.

# **Grading Policy**

Student's must receive a "C-" or higher in order to pass this course. The department's standard grading scheme consists of the following: Requirements for particular assignments will vary, but in all cases essay grades will reflect the paper's effectiveness, which is broken down into three major areas: content (this includes maturity and sophistication of thought), organization, and expression.

- 1. "A" range work is organized and well-developed, demonstrating a clear understanding and fulfillment of the assignment, written in a unique and compelling voice. It will show the student's ability to use language effectively with a solid command of grammar, mechanics, and usage.
- 2. "B" range work demonstrates competence in the same categories as an "A" essay, but it may show slight weakness in one of these areas. It will respond to the topic suitably and may contain some grammatical, mechanical or usage errors.
- 3. "C" range work will complete the requirements of the assignment, but it will show weaknesses in fundamentals, such as development. It may show weakness in mastery of grammar, mechanics, usage, or voice.
- 4. "D" range work will neglect to meet all the requirements of the assignment or may be superficial in its treatment of the topic. It may lack development or fail to stay on topic. It may contain grammatical, mechanical, and/or usage errors that interfere with reader comprehension.
- 5. "F" essay does not fulfill the requirements of the assignment.

# Extra credit

- A fourth critical response will be accepted for extra credit. This is option is only available if you have completed the first three critical responses.
- Attendance for 1 additional Poetic event.

# Late work

- Late work is accepted if you reach out to me and communicate the issue at hand. The only way late work will be accepted, past the due date and without communication, is in the case of an emergency. If there is an emergency, you must provide written documentation.
- There are four units to this course that are centered on each essay. Work that is submitted past its unit, will receive an automatic ten point reduction, per new unit.
