Building on the skills acquired in ENGL 1A, you will learn various methods of effective reasoning and appropriate rhetorical strategies to help you invent, demonstrate, and express arguments clearly, logically, and persuasively. COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

- 1. Short Writing Tasks: You will write a number of informal assignments designed to provide practice in the different argumentative concepts discussed in class and in the course readings. These tasks will require you both to analyze and to create arguments using the strategies and frameworks developed by the different theorists. Short Writing Tasks will be completed both in and outside of class. You must be present to receive credit for tasks written during class time.
- 2. <u>Critical Thinking Map</u>: You will construct a document that *maps* out an argument. Think of the map as a very detailed outline of an argument.

- 3. <u>Essay Assignments</u>: You will write two argumentative essays. Each essay will go through at least one revision before receiving a grade.
- 4. Multimodal Project: You will design a multimedia presentation of your written essay.

COURSE POLICIES
