Course Description and Requisites

English 2 is a course that focuses on the relationship between language and logic in composing arguments. Students learn various methods of effective reasoning and appropriate rhetorical strategies to help them invent, demonstrate, and express arguments clearly, logically, and persuasively.

≅ Course Requirements and Assignments

The course writing assignments (see below) will give you repeated practice in all phases of the writing process: prewriting, organizing, writing, revising, and editing. You will receive frequent evaluations of your writing from me. Evaluative comments will be substantive, addressing both the logic of the argument and the quality and form of the writing. Comments will encourage and acknowledge success as well as note problems and suggest ways to improve.

- 1. Informal Writing: You will complete several informal writing assignments designed to provide practice in the different rhetorical concepts discussed in the course readings. These assignments will require you both to analyze and to create arguments using the strategies and frameworks developed by different theorists.
- 2. Formal Writing Projects: You will complete three major assignments: a rhetorical analysis, a rhetorical revision, and a style revision.
- 3. Portfolio: You will also be required to submit a course-wide assessment portfolio.
