Course Description

The relationship between humans and the environments around them are constantly changing. The field of environmental studies is engaged in understanding the causes, dynamics, and solutions to environmental problems. In this course, students will learn about a wide array of environmental topics, engage with critical readings and discussions on these issues as well as the scientific research, activism, and policy action that communities in the U.S. and around the world are engaging in to promote environmental justice and sustainability.

Course Format

Even though we will be meeting in person we will be using the online Canvas modules extensively to engage in discussions, submit assignments, take assessments, and gain access to readings and additional videos.

Learning Outcomes and Course Goals

This course has four main learning objectives, which include:

- 1. learning about important environmental problems
- 2. the relationships between humans and their surrounding environments
- 3. the research around these problems and relationships, and
- 4. ways in which individual and collective actions can help solve environmental problems and create more sustainable futures.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Understand and explain key environmental issues.
- 2. Analyze the interrelationships between resource use, economics, politics, social justice, and environmental degradation.
- 3. Identify social, political, and technical solutions that will guide change towards more sustainable communities today, and in the years to come.

This course fulfills the following General Education Learning Outcomes (GELO):

- 1. Place contemporary developments in cultural, historical, environmental, and spatial context.
- 2. Identify the dynamics of ethnic, cultural, gender/sexual, age-based, class, regional, national, transnational, and global identities and the similarities, differences, linkages, and interactions between them.
- 3. Evaluate social science information, draw on different points of view, and formulate applications appropriate to contemporary social situations.
- 4. Apply multidisciplinary material to a topic relevant to policy and social action at the local, national, and/or international levels.

Course Requirements and Assignments

To be successful in this course it is expected that students will spend time reading, listening to the lectures, watching videos, and participating in course activities, discussion, and writing. Each week will focus on a single module with one or more of the following elements - module objectives and checklist, readings, lectures, assignment or discussion, and any other assessments like position papers, in-class activities or finals. Students will be evaluated based on the following:

Plagiarism Quiz

Provided by the university, this quiz will help you learn the nuances of plagiarism and the consequences at San José State University.

Current Event and Presentation

Each student will find a current event article that relates to a topic of a week of their choosing and will write a 250-500 word reflection of the event and share a 3-minute presentation in class. The current event could come from an accredited newspaper, journal article, lawsuit, or government ruling.

Position Paper Mind Map

The purpose of the Position Paper Mind Map is to help you get a jumpstart on your essay. While developing your Mind Map, you will need to pick an environmental issue, research some facts about the issue, learn about the policies and social movements around the issue and present a possible solution. Please read the rubric carefully to make sure you include all the elements required. It is entirely possible that you might change your ideas for the final paper; that is completely fine. This Mind Map will help you get started and will give you an opportunity to ask me questions and think about your issue. Please note that the textbook counts as a valid primary source and has some excellent information. You might start there during your research.

Position Paper

Each 5-7 (1,250-3,000) page paper focuses on an environmental issue. Based on insights from your connection to the topic, readings, videos, lectures, discussions, and your own research, discuss your perspective on the environmental issue that you chose. **First**, tell your story of why this issue means something to you. Describe your

connection; it might include your reason for interest, or a personal experience related to this issue. **Second**, describe the issue and characterize how it has occurred. Please use valid science and social science data in the analysis of the issue. **Third**, explain the positions on the issue and the movements and policies (if any) that relate to the issue. **Fourth**, explain your stand on the issue and your opinion of the current movements and/or policies regarding the issue. **Finally**, offer your solution to this issue. A solution might include technological innovation, community involvement, another policy, enforcement of existing policies, another solution or combination of solutions.

Module Quizzes

Each module concludes with a short quiz to help prepare for the midterm and to help synthesize the week's lesson and topics.

Assignments and Online Discussions

The assignments are designed to deepen the student's knowledge and connection to the subject. Discussions are designed in the form of a debate. Students are expected to remain respectful and kind in their responses to peers and cite evidence to support their arguments in their posts.

In-Class Work

Each class session will include group work, discussions, hypothetical situations, presentations, and reflections. Students are expected to have completed the reading for the day's topic and participate.

Final Project

The final project explores the natural resources, communities, and environmental issues of a single location. This is a group project of a minimum of 2 and maximum of 3 people. The project involves building a web page using Adobe Spark and presenting your research in class. All of the guidelines are provided in a mock web page.
