There are lots of ways you can help:



The first time I flew back to China was a year after I moved to the U.S. The excitement of going home motivated me to pass quickly through the chaos in the SFO Airport, and find my seat in the cabin. As soon as I sat down, I realized a new problem that I had to face before hugging my family members- how to kill the boring 12 hours on the flight! After looking around, I found the guy sitting next to me seem to have the same concern.

I started the classic ice breaking talk, "*Hi, I am Martin, nice to meet you.*" "*Hey, David, nice to meet you too.*" He stretched out his hand. Then, we briefly shared our purpose in taking this flight.

He is from San Jose and he had been an exchange student studying at the university in my hometown city. After he finished his studies a couple of years ago, he moved back to California. He was on his way back to China to join the wedding of a friend of his.

He asked, "Where do you study?" "San Jose State University", I answered. "Wow, I graduated from the same school." He was a little surprised, so was I.

That was a non-stop flight. Thus, there is a big chance that one of two people sitting next to each other is from the departure location, while the other one is from the destination location. Then, I also admit that it is not very surprising that both went to the same school. However, what happened next was a big jaw dropping to everyone that I shared the story with after.

"Where do you live?" he asked.

"International House." I answered. As an international student, I have been asked this question thousands of times. "International House is like a dorm where the residents are...", like how I usually answer, I started to add more details. "Really?" He interrupted and turned his head more left towards me with a big surprise in his eyes.

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What's even more unbelievable: It turned out that he used to live in the SAME ROOM where I was living at that moment! I cannot remember how many topics we talked about on the rest of that flight. However, for sure, we exchanged our opinions on food, languages, climates, lifestyles and so on. Of those topics, we have a lot of ideas in common, also lots of different thoughts. Because of those we shared in common, we became more understanding about those differences.

What a small world! We come across strangers every day, especially when taking a trip. On that day, after entering the airport, I was crossing strangers almost every single second. To me, somehow, they were like silhouettes and I would never think of associating myself with any of them. However, I found, among them, there is one who was one of the strangers; one second later, he became my old friend. This just happened





