Course Description

This course will examine the strengths and limitations of criminal profiling in investigations, its concepts and methodologies, history, and psychological and scientific underpinnings. Practical application of theory and principles to actual cases will stress students' abilities to reason logically, make connections between established facts, and draw evidence-based inferences about offenders.

Course Format

The mode of instruction for this course is synchronous online. This means that we will meet at the scheduled class time (Tuesdays 12:00pm-2:30pm) in an online classroom via Zoom. Attendance is required.

Technology Requirements
