Course Description

A substantial paper/mock evaluation of a justice agency program, justice policy, or organizational issue.

Students will be required to conduct a small research project, on a justice related topic of their choosing, for this course.

Course Format

The mode of instruction for this course is synchronous online. This means that we will meet at the scheduled class time (Thursdays 4:30 pm - 7:15 pm) in an online classroom via Zoom.

Technology Intensive, Hybrid, and Online Courses

This class adopts a synchronous, online format. Class will meet via Zoom on Thursdays from 4:30 pm to 7:15 pm. All instruction takes place online. Physical in-person or campus meeting may be required for the presentation of the program evaluation project at the end of the semester. Internet connectivity, a computer, and access to software apps (including Microsoft Office, Adobe Player, Canvas, etc.) are required for this class.

Students are required to have an electronic device (laptop, desktop or tablet) with a camera and built-in microphone. SJSU has a free equipment loan program available for students (<u>https://www.sjsu.edu/learnanywhere/equipment/index.php</u>). Students are responsible for ensuring that they have access to reliable Wi-Fi during class. If students are unable to have reliable Wi-Fi, they must inform the instructor, as soon as possible to determine an alternative. See Learn Anywhere website for current Wi-Fi options on campus.

Use of Camera in Class

Zoom Classroom Etiquette

Course Requirements and Assignments

Description of Applied Project

In this assignment students are required to provide a brief description of the proposed topic for their applied project. The information included in this section will form the basis of their introduction section. Additional information is available on Canvas. This assignment is due on Canvas on 9/01 by 11:59 pm.

Review of Relevant Literature

The "Review of Relevant Literature" section should be divided into 3 to 4 subsections. One of the sub-sections in the "Review of Relevant Literature" section should be devoted to developing the theoretical framework. **Students must** include at least 20 peer-reviewed journal articles in this section. A minimum of 30 peer-reviewed articles must be incorporated throughout the applied project. Additional information is available on Canvas. This assignment is due on Canvas on 9/08 by 11:59 pm.

Applied Project Proposal

This proposal serves as a draft of the first half of your applied project. The proposal must be in paragraph format and structured with the following headings: cover page, abstract, introduction, review of relevant literature, methodology and references. Additional information is available on Canvas. This assignment is due on Canvas on 9/15 by 11:59 pm.

Findings and Analysis

This assignment serves as a draft of the second half of your applied project. The findings and analysis paper must be in paragraph format and structured with the following headings: results, discussion, conclusion, and references. Additional information is available on Canvas. This assignment is due on Canvas on 11/17 at 11:59 pm.

Applied Project Paper

This "Applied Project Paper" serves as part of your culminating activity for the MS in Justice Studies program. The paper must be in paragraph format and structured with the following headings: cover page, abstract,

introduction, review of relevant literature, methodology, results, discussion, conclusion, and references. Additional information is available on Canvas. This assignment is due on Canvas on 12/01 at 11:59 pm.

Applied Project Presentation

Students are required to present the research they conducted for their applied project to the class via PowerPoint and at the Graduate Student Showcase. PowerPoint presentations last between 9 to 10 minutes. Additional information is available on Canvas. This assignment is due in class on 12/01 and at the Graduate Student Showcase on 12/07.

"Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally three hours per unit per week) for instruction, preparation/studying, or course related activities, including but not limited to internships, labs, and clinical practica. Final Examination or Evaluation

Submission of the "Applied Project Paper" and presentation of the applied project at the Graduate Showcase will serve as the culminating activity for JS 297.

If all requirements are not met, students will receive NC—unless they make prior arrangements with the professor to finish with an Report in Progress (RP) grade.
