Prerequisites:

1. Passing the "MUSC 1A Entrance Examination" with a score of 80% or better (administered on the first

scheduled class day). Students who have successfully passed MUSC 9, Music Fundamentals, with a grade of 'C-' (70%) or better within the past two years at SJSU are exempt from this Exam. Those students who do not pass the Entrance Examination must enroll in MUSC 9 (Music Fundamentals) before enrolling in MUSC 1A in

a subsequent semester.

 Rudimentary piano skills (successful completion of the Piano Proficiency Examination or concurrent enrollment in MUSC 25A/B, Class Piano) are expected, as well as knowledge of basic music fundamentals: major and minor scales and key signatures, intervals, triads and basic rhythm patterns in simple and compound meters.

This class is only open to music majors and music minors.

Course Fees: Music majors and minors must pay a music equipment use

fee of \$30 each semester. The fee must be paid directly to the Cashier's Office, and you must bring the receipt to the Music Office before completing registration. Applied music

instruction will not be authorized until this fee is paid.

# **Course Description**

Music Systems is a multi-semester course sequence containing two areas of study: written analytical skills and aural skills. MUSC 1A is the first course in this sequence, focusing on written analytical skills. Topics include acoustics, rhythm, melody, harmony, timbre, scales and modes, structure, texture, form, style, and contexts for performance and composition. Examples for study are drawn from the Renaissance through early twenty-first century compositions of the Western European and American traditions, with supplementary examples from other musical practices when appropriate.

# **Course Goals and Learning Objectives**

#### **Course Learning Outcomes (CLO)**

CLO1 Demonstrate understanding and synthesis of the elementary / foundational principles of harmony and musical structure.

CLO2 Demonstrate understanding of the principles of diatonic harmony and basic part writing, and the ability to apply these concepts to music they encounter whether aurally or in written form.

CLO3 Demonstrate application of harmonic principles to their own musical compositions, in the form of Bach-style chorale harmonization and voice-leading.

CLO4 Relate the above concepts to their further study of advanced musical theory.

#### Classroom Protocol

- 1. Class will start every day on time.
- 2. All electronic devices must be turned off while in class (for example: iEverythings, computers, etc.). There are no exceptions to this rule.
- 3. Attendance at all class sessions is absolutely essential. Active class discussion is expected as comprehension and critical thinking are vital aspects of being a professional musician.
- 4. Success in this course will not come from merely attending lectures and completing assignments. To master this material, you must spend sufficient time outside of class for preparation, listening and study.
  - SJSU classes are designed such that in order to be successful, it is expected that students will spend a minimum of forty-five hours for each unit of credit (normally three hours per unit per week), including preparing for class, participating in course activities, completing assignments, and so on. # **Course Requirements, Assignments and Grading Policy**

- 1. With better than 70% accuracy, students will be expected to:
  - 1. Analyze selected musical examples aurally and visually, and describe stylistic characteristics.
  - 2. Complete part-writing, analysis and composition homework assignments.
  - 3. Complete comprehensive midterm and final examinations.
- 2. Assigned homework, quizzes and exams will be graded. Homework and quizzes may be given at any time. A grade of 0 (zero) will be entered for any missed quizzes and exams, and for any assignments not turned in.
- 3. Assignments are due at the <u>beginning</u> of class on the due date. Assignments that are not stapled together will receive a 5% penalty, and any assignment submitted late (unless excused in advance by the instructor) will receive a 15% penalty. Late assignments will only be accepted up to the beginning of the next class period after the due date. However, please note that mid-

semester and/or final semester projects will not be accepted late for any reason.

- 4. Absence does not grant special privileges regarding written assignments and material covered in class. Students are responsible for all material discussed in class, whether present or not. The due dates for assignments do not change because of an absence. Missed quizzes and exams will not be made up except as follows:
  - 1. Documented absences due to illness (with a doctor's certificate), family emergency, or for an excused school function will be handled at the instructor's discretion.
