Course Description

Theatre Appreciation is the study of the historical and cultural contexts of theatre around the world. Seeing and critical writing about plays. Hands-on experiences in the arts and crafts of live theatre. (3 Units) No Prerequisites.

This course gives students the opportunity to study and experience live performance theoretically, historically, and practically, in order to better appreciate and therefore, enjoy this unique art form. Students will discover through a variety of experiences and activities that live performance is a collaborative artistic process that sets in motion, an opportunity for both performers and audience to undergo an aesthetic experience.

- **A** Excellent. Always prepared; extensive outside preparation. Actively pursues improvement and highly self motivated. Student makes significant growth in skill and knowledge during semester. Active, positive contributor to class.
- **B** Good to excellent. Always prepared; notable outside preparation. Pursues improvement and self motivated. Notable growth in skills and knowledge during semester. Positive contributor to class.
- **C** Acceptable to good. Generally prepared; acceptable outside preparation. Interested in improvement and often self motivated. Shows some growth in skills and knowledge during semester. Contributes to class.

To request an "incomplete" a student must have completed 2/3 of the semester work and be passing the class.

Participation. Participation points can be earned in the following ways: Significant contribution to class discussions, including leading class discussions, and active participation in class activities and exercises. Many of these points will require you to check in with D2L to receive the information needed for the activities/discussions. In order to receive participation points *you must be present* in class. *Just showing up for class does not guarantee participation points.* I realize that emergencies do arise, (if medical, you must have a doctor's approval for an excused absence), so please give your project partners and your instructor the courtesy of a phone call or email immediately to report an absence in

class or meeting. Documentation may be required to receive an excused absence. It is your responsibility to get any information or work missed from fellow students.

Response Essay. Personal Response essays are 500- word essays with a focus on topics from the text, theatre and film performances, or guest speakers. Guidelines and grading will be reviewed in class.

Library Research. All students are required to attend the library tutorial on the assigned date in the course schedule. You will select a research topic of your choice and learn how to find information using the library sources and present your findings to your group.

Performance Critiques. You are required to attend three theater performances. A written performance critique is required for each performance. These reviews are to be 500 word critiques (approximately 1 ½ pages) and guidelines will be posted on D2L. One of the critiques will be an online review for Artsopolis,

(http://www.artsopolis.com/event/cat/theatre). All papers are to be turned in to the appropriate D2L drop box. No late assignments accepted.
