### Course Goals

The two primary goals of the course are (1) to provide students with a general understanding of the various types of psychological disorders discussed within the field of psychological science, and (2) to develop an ability to think critically about these disorders and the study of them as abnormal behavior. Thinking critically means considering a patient's cultural and contextual factors to understand the various causes of suffering and how to alleviate it.

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This class is designed to give you as much choice as possible, while still having you learn the content for this course very well. When I think about what you need to know at the end of this course it is:

- 1) the names and characteristics of a whole bunch of psychological disorders so you can impress your friends and family with your random knowledge, and
- 2) how to **think critically about how we diagnose and treat psychological disorders** so we avoid thinking of these disorders are a "thing" you can "have" without thinking about culture and context.

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With this in mind, there will be the following assignments:

#### Module Quizzes

Quizzes will be over the assigned reading and lecture material for each module. You can learn the material to do well on the quizzes by doing the following: 1) attending lectures (Tuesday and Thursdays 3:00 – 4:15pm) and/or 2) reading and understanding the assigned chapter in the textbook. If you are not scoring as high on the quizzes as you would like, try attending lecture after having read the chapter in the textbook – this will dramatically increase your understanding and your score.

The quizzes will be due the day after each topic's lectures at 11:59pm (note: sometimes this will be Friday and sometimes it will be Wednesday - pay attention to Canvas due dates). Quiz questions will be randomly drawn from a test bank covering that module's material so no two quizzes will be the same. You can open them anytime before they are due but they will only be open for 10 minutes.

#### Midterm and Final Exams

There will be 3 total exams in this class, and all will have the same format. The exams will include 25 multiple-choice questions (2 points each) and your choice of 2 essay questions (25 points each) to ensure that you are thinking critically about the larger context of the disorders we are covering. These essay questions will be completed in class with the multiple choice questions and will be more focused on topics we talked about in lecture for each section.
